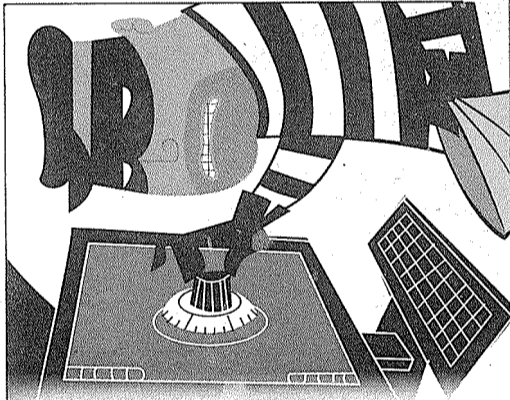

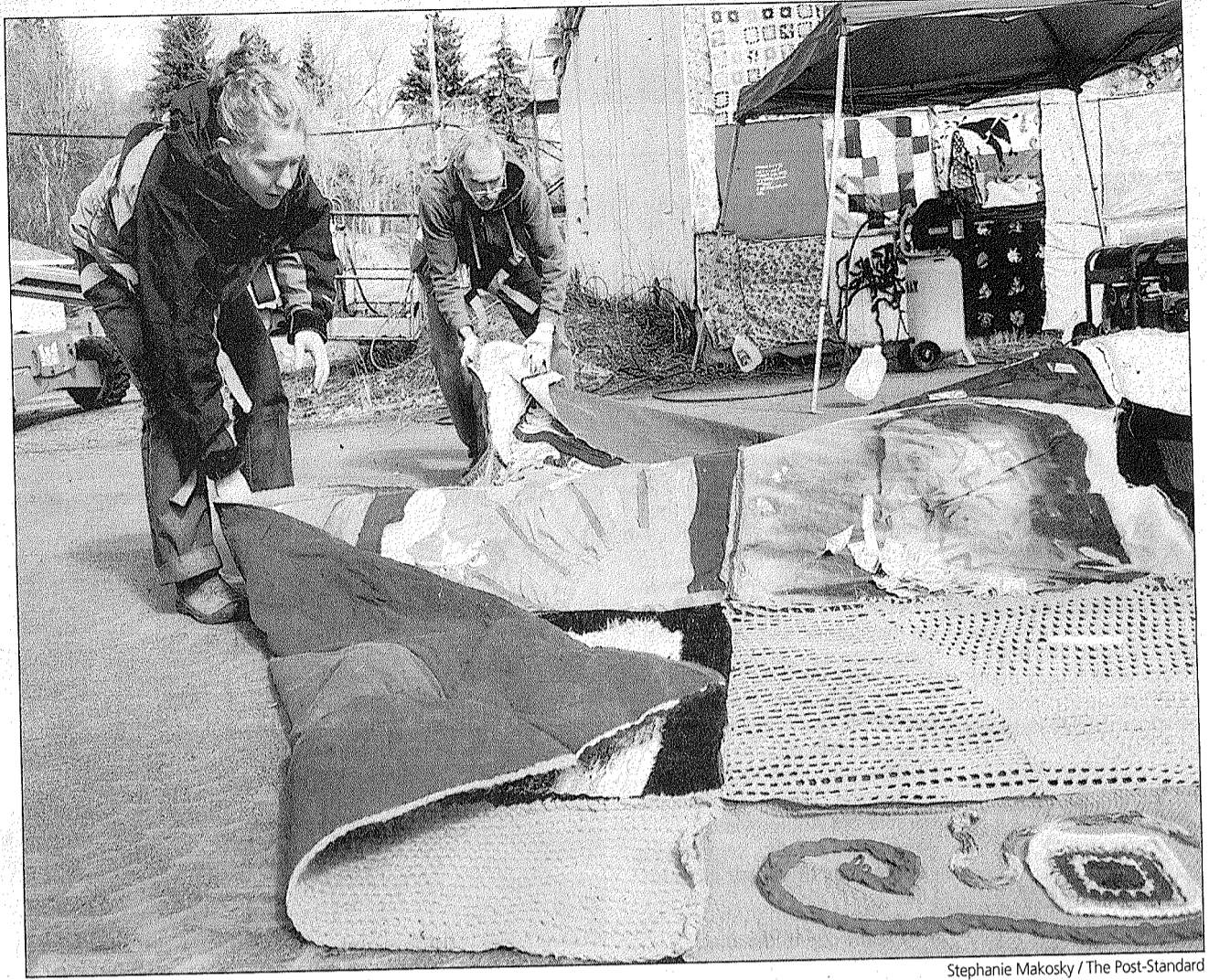

## Vacant building a work of art

**PANELS ON JENNIFER MARSH'S** art project were made by both local and international artists. About 3,400 panels were used. Panels were waterproofed and wooden plates were screwed in between the seams of the fabric to keep it secure.

An ugly abandoned DeWitt gas station is half-way to becoming pretty.

After two 13-hour days, Syracuse University graduate art student Jennifer Marsh and friends have blanketed half of the station at East Colvin Street and Nottingham Road with fabric panels that were crocheted, knitted, quilted and stitched by people from around the country.

"We will have the building done by Monday night," predicted Marsh, who planned to begin work there at 6 a.m. today.

Her project is using fabric arts to make an artistic statement about the world's dependence on oil.
